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About Royal Families: Americans of Royal and Noble Ancestry. Vol. 2 Anne (Marbury) Hutchinson, declared among some in her seventeenth-century world as a religious "heretic," defied many of the most powerful men in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, including Governor Thomas Dudley, in defense of her strong beliefs. She endured a "trial by fire," without benefit of a jury of her peers, in a highly charged court where these men challenged and mocked her views on religion. Her banishment from Salem and Boston drove her to a new colony called Rhode Island, which her mentor and friend Roger Williams co-founded.

Thousands of Americans can claim the Marbury family's lineal connections to their royal and noble ancestry, from William the Conqueror through Edward I. These ancestors include John, King of England, who signed the Magna Carta in 1215 at Runnymede, as well as many of the barons who witnessed his signature on that famous document. All later kinds of Spain, Holy Roman and Austrian emperors, most later English and French kinds, all kings of Prussia and Russian czars, beginning with Alexander I, are distant cousins as well.

This volume is the second in a projected multi-volume series dealing with Americans of royal and noble ancestry. Taking the colonial period as a point of departure, it focuses on two of Reverend Francis Marbury's daughters, Anne and Katherine, who immigrated with their husbands to the New World in the 1630s. It covers the first five generations of their descendants, carrying the various lines up to and beyond the Revolutionary War, into the sixth generation. The generational layout of the work follows a modified format of the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, with citations for all five generations based exclusively on vital records and approved family histories.

The book concludes with an every-name index of several thousand entries and a comprehensive bibliography. In addition, the author appended a "Lineage Society Index" with names of eligible ancestors in a number of hereditary societies, including the Colonial Clergy, Colonial Governors, Mayflower Descendants, and Revolutionary War Patriots.

1. REV. FRANCIS' MARBURY; bap. 27 Oct 1555 St. Pancras, Soper Lane, London; 1 m. Bridget DRYDEN ca 1587 Canons Ashby, co. Northhampton; d. Jan 1610/11 Alford, co. Lincoln. He was the son of William and Agnes (Lenton) MARBURY, Gentleman of Girsby in Burgh-upon-Bain, co. Lincoln. Agnes was the daughter of John Lenton, Esq., probably of Aldwinkle, co. Northampton. Francis was born about eight years after the death of Henry VIII and three years before Elizabeth I was crowned Queen of England, at a time when the Anglican Church shared considerable power in England. The Queen positioned herself as the head of the Church of England, and defeated the Spanish Catholics. England became a country of great religious activity, with Anglican bishops and ministers taking dominant positions in the government and courts. People loyal to the queen were pressing for church rites, teachings and rituals that would clearly separate their new church from Catholicism. In this atmosphere, some small groups wanted to change the church even more, to rid it of any formal ritual that would suggest a relationship with the Catholics. These people were called Puritans. It was during these times that Francis Marbury was matriculated pensioner from Christ College, Cambridge, in May 1571, but did not receive a degree. He was ordained deacon in 1578. He m. 1st Elizabeth MOORE and had three children.

It was about this time that Francis began to teach and preach at the church in Northampton near the Dryden estate. Although he had been educated at Cambridge University, he soon found that many of the Anglican ministers were not well educated but appointed to their positions by the ruling bishops for political reasons. The young minister so openly opposed this lack of an educated clergy that in 1578 he was arrested and sent to jail. After he was released and now a widower, he chose to move from Northampton; m. Bridget Dryden and they settled in Alford co. Lincoln, about 125 miles from London. There, Francis supported his growing family by preaching and teaching at St. Wilfred's Church.

His reformist preaching led to his imprisonment in the Marshalsea where he wrote an allegorical play in 1579 entitled *The Contract of Marriage between Wit and Wisdom*. He was a curate and schoolmaster by 1585 in Alford, co. Lincoln. He was ordained priest in 1605 and became successively Rector of Martin's Vintry, London, of St. Pancras, Soper Lane and of St. Margaret's, New Fish Street.

Bridget's older brother Erasmus Dryden later became the grandfather of the famous English poet John Dryden. Many in her family were Puritans, and at least one relative had been imprisoned in the Tower of London for suggesting religious reforms. The Dryden ancestry traces back through English nobility and the royal lines of Alfred the Great and Charlemagne. Bridget bore Francis thirteen children, the second of whom was Anne, later to become the famous Anne Hutchinson, defender of religious freedom. At the time of Anne's birth in

1591, her father was again in trouble over his quarrels with the Anglican leaders. They accused him of being a Puritan and, even though he won his trial, he was forbidden to preach again for several years. This was a benefit for Anne, for now her father could spend his time tending the fields near their home and teaching his young daughter. Anne learned to read through the Bible and an account of her father's first trial, which he had published. Anne moved to the American Colonies, where she and her youngest sister Katherine were destined to play an historic role in the theocratic village of Boston by demanding religious freedom and the right to assemble peaceably. Francis and Bridget had provided the upbringing necessary for these girls to play such a vital role. Francis Marbury's will of 25 Jan 1610/11 was proved 14 Feb 1610/11.^{2,3}

BRIDGET DRYDEN; b. ca 1563 Canons Ashby, co. Nothampton; d. 1644/45 Berkhamsted, co. Hertford. She was the daughter of John and Elizabeth (Cope) DRYDEN, Gent. of Canons Ashby, co. Northampton. Bridget spent much of her time helping others. She was a skilled midwife, who assisted the women of the community whenever they were giving birth. As she grew older, Anne accompanied her mother on these goodwill visits, and in time she herself became a midwife. Bridget's royal and noble ancestry includes descent from Edward I of England through his daughter Elizabeth, wife of Humphrey de Bohun, Earl of Hereford and Essex. Bridget m. 2nd Rev. Thomas NEWMAN of Berkhamsted, co. Hertford. Her will of 12 Feb 1644/5 was administered 2 Apr 1645.⁴

2. Anne MARBURY (Francis'); bap. 20 Jul 1591 Alford, co. Lincoln;5 m. William HUTCHINSON, son of Edward HUTCHINSON and Susanna _), 9 Aug 1612 London; d. 20 Sep 1643 Hutchinson Farm, Pelham Bay, N. Y. She immigrated on 18 Sep 1634 to Boston on the ship Griffin. 6 She was no stranger to religion as the daughter of a deacon at Christ Church, Cambridge, co. Cambridge. She was devoted to teachings of the Reverend John Cotton, who had immigrated a year earlier to Boston on the Griffin, along with her sister Catherine and husband Richard Scott. She missed his departure very much, which inspired her to follow him to New England a year later. She and her husband eventually settled in Boston where she became a skilled midwife. However, she soon found her environment to be religiously oppressive. Only the men were allowed to hold prayer meetings Nevertheless, she organized her own meetings with the women in her home, to discuss the previous Sunday sermon. However, she began to tell them of her own beliefs in direct contradiction to the Boston ministers. She attracted hundreds of women, along with many men who joined her as well. Among the men who visited her home was Sir Henry Vane, who became governor of the Colony in 1636. However, when Gov. Vane lost his postion in 1637 to John Winthrop, Anne's behavior was considered immoral. Winthrop described her meetings as "a thing not tolerable nor comely in the sight of God, nor fitting for your sex," and accused her of breaking the Fifth Commandment by not honoring her father and mother (in this case, the magistrates of the colony). She was banished from Massachusetts Bay Colony in March 1638. She joined Rev. Roger Williams who was banished from Salem in 1636. He established Rhode Island in 1638 where Anne and her family lived from 1638 until her husband's death in 1642. She moved with her children to New Netherland (to what is now Pelham Bay Park in the Bronx), where she and five of her children were massacred by Indians in 1643.7

[Note: Emery Battis, in his book Saints and Sectaries: Anne Hutchinson and the Antinomian Controversy in the Massachusetts Bay Colony (New York: Van Rees Press, 1962), provides a comprehensive description of Anne Hutchinson's life in the Colony along with her trials and tribulations that were brought on by her strong religious convictions. Much of his material was drawn from the writings of Rev. John Cotton, John Wheelwright and Governor John Winthrop (in his Journal). Some of the well-known judges at her Boston trial included Governors Thomas Dudley and John Winthrop, Simon Bradstreet (Dudley's son-in-law and later governor of the Colony), Increase Nowell, John Edicott, Richard Bellingham (also one of the Colony governors),

John Coddingtion (later of Newport) and Hugh Peter. Witnesses (for and against Anne) included John Eliot, George Phillips from Watertown, Zachariah Symmes from Charlestown and John Coggeshall (later of Newport). Ultimately, her "conviction" led to her dismissal from the Colony and relocation to Rhode Island and then to Pelham Bay, New York and eventual death during the Indian massacre on her farm. One of the important conclusions derived from her ordeal was that she had been denied the right of trial by jury, although comparisons to the justice system of today must be carefully avoided.]

WILLIAM HUTCHINSON; b. 1586 Alford, co. Lincoln; d. 1642 Boston, Mass. He came in the ship with Rev. John Lathrop and Zechary Symmes in 1634. He had lived at Alford, co. Lincoln, about 25 miles from Boston, co. Lincoln. He and his wife Anne were apparently drawn to America by their admiration of Rev. John Cotton. He immigrated on 18 Sep 1634 to Boston on the ship Griffin along with his children.8 He was admitted to full communion on 10 Oct 1634 First Church, Boston. He became a freeman 4 Mar. 1635, was a representative in May 1635 and served in the courts. He was affected by the violence of the religious controversy, in which his friends Sir Henry Vane and John Cotton were defeated. His family and others of the party were very severely treated. He was forced, with [John] Coddington and other prominent men, to remove to Rhode Island in 1638. They formed a new civil compact, not much unlike that of Massachusetts. William was an assistant in 1639. After his death in 1642, his widow Ann, who had been the gifted prophetess of the doleful heresies that shook and almost subverted the colony of Massachusetts, left Rhode Island beyond Connecticut to the Dutch Province [New Amsterdam]. After having been fairly established in her new plantation, she and several of her children and others (about sixteen in all) were killed by the Indians.9

RICHARD SCOTT; b. 9 Sep 1605 Glemsford, co. Suffolk; d. 1679/80 Providence. He was the son of Edward and Sarah (Carter) SCOTT of Glemsford. He was a shoemaker. He immigrated on 4 Sep 1633 to Boston on the ship Griffin. He was admitted to full communion on 28 Aug 1634 First Church, Boston. Although he was admitted to the church, his wife Catherine did not join, nor his children Richard, John, Mary or Patience. He is on the list of freeman in 1655, and was among the Quaker converts in 1658. His wife, "an ancient woman," was imprisoned and whipped at Boston for "benevolent service in diffusion of her opinions." Her daughters Mary and Patience also were imprisoned "by equal impolicy." 13

He was purported to have been the son of William SAVAGE, a blacksmith of Taunton, co. Somerset, but further research is needed. Thomas was apprenticed at Merchant Tailors, London, as the company records prove, "in the 18th year of James, 9 Jan. 1621." He immigrated in Apr 1635 to Boston [at age 27] on the ship *Planter*, Nicholas Trarice, master. He was admitted to full communion in Jan 1635/36 First Church, Boston. He was admitted a freeman of the town of Boston on 25 May 1636. He was an adherent of his sister-in-law Anne Hutchinson and supported her during her trial, as well as sharing the opinions of Rev. John Wheelwright. This led to his being disarmed and obliged to leave Boston in Nov 1637 and was driven to unite with Gov. William Coddington. 26,27

He prevailed with the government in 1659 to spare his wife's life after she had come to Boston to preach Quakerism and was condemned to die. However, her insane desire for martyrdom led her back to Boston in 1660 to scaffold, serving to show how useless the unnatural lenity of Gov. Endicott, "who knew well what the honor of God demanded,"84,85
