Number to left in Register and Notes (1912-42) are the identification numbers that appear in 1st edition. Each new name is given a Serial number, starting with the last number in the 1st edition and advancing in order, without regard to generation.

The total number of descendants of Thomas McComb (No. 1) registered in both editions (including adopted children) is over 2800.

Names without numbers mean records were received late, but were placed in their family group.

Names in Addenda received too late for genealogical numbers are given accurate serial numbers. (Corrections in 1st edition noted.)

PREFACE

The following compilation is the growth of years. It was undertaken in the first place simply with the intention of answering questions of my own children in regard to family connections.

Inquiries had not proceeded far until it became evident that there was in existence no comprehensive and formal register of either the ancestors or the descendants of my paternal grandfather; and furthermore, that unless existing records were soon collected their loss would be but a question of a very short time. In the hope therefore of preserving these records, and discovering and marking the line of descent of our people, this work has been prosecuted through many years. The records of individual families have been searched out and carefully copied; parents have furnished names and dates of births, marriages, and deaths of their children; public records,—deeds, wills, etc.—have been examined; and every effort has been made to secure accuracy. That there may not be found mistakes would be too much to expect. The compiler has not intentionally omitted any items concerning persons or families, suitable for such a register, with which he has been furnished.

Special acknowledgment is due to Mrs. Paul Caine of Boston for the use of her genealogical notes, and a copy of her report on the McComb line of descent; and to Rev. Messrs. Wood, Wylie and Wheeler, who placed at my disposal respectively "The History of the Presbytery of Washington," certified copies of the Minutes of Session of Middle Spring Church, and "The History of Middle Spring Church." Besides these, thanks are due to the great number of persons who have so kindly searched out and copied Bible records and other records for the use in this Register. Names are spelled as given. As to the form into which the matter has been cast it may be remarked that it was not intended to be a history, but simply what is styled a "Register of a McComb family in America." Only the line of descent is traced back into the old country.

It will be observed that in the margin of the Register there are two columns of figures, the inside figures are the consecutive numbers of the persons recorded; the outside figures refer to a preceding generation and the inside figures to one following.

To follow the record of any person take his number as it is given in the *inside* column and turn forward until that number appears in the

outside column. Thus William McComb is No. 17, to find his record turn forward till No. 17 is found in the *outside* column.

In this work I have often been impressed with the ignorance of each other prevailing among those whose kinship is close; and one of the pleasures has been to put cousins of various degrees into communication with one another.

And now that my work is done I dedicate it to the generations of my people in the hope that what I have done may serve to quicken interest, and bring kindred into closer fellowship.

THE McCOMB FAMILY

The name "McComb" appears in various, not to say puzzling, forms in the records of this family. The spelling is often found to vary in different parts of the same document.

Harry Alfred Long in his "Personal and family names," published by John Menzie & Co., Edinburgh, 1883, derives the names 'McComb,' 'McCombe,' 'McComber,' 'McCumber,' etc., from the gaelic 'Omish' (Thomas), and says that other forms of the same names are 'McOmish,' 'McTarith' and 'McTause.'

A memoir of the families of McCombie and Thomas (originally McInrosh and McThomas), by William McCombie Smith, Edinburgh, 1890, say that "McThomies, McHomie, McOmie, McOmish, McOmry, McComie, McCombie; and Thomas, McThomas, and McInrosh, are all names used to designate members of the same clan."

S. A. Dewick in his "Ancestry of John S. Gustin," says that the name McThomas, son of McInrosh, changed gradually from 'McHomie' to 'McComie, McCombie' and McCombe. He also finds that the letter 'y' was added in the eighteenth century, and the name was sometimes written "Macomb."

According to the findings of Antiquarians the McCombie family is a branch of the clan McInrosh, which was a branch of the clan Charran.

In Anderson's "Scottish Nation," Vol. 2, p. 944, it is shown that "the family of McInrosh into which Eva, only daughter and heiress of Dugal Phaol, Captain of the clan Charran married in 1292, sprang from Shaw or Shengh, second son of Duncan McDuff, the fifth Earl of Fife. And the name arose in the following manner: Shaw McDuff being sent by King Malcolm IV, in the year 1163, to quell a rebellion in Morayland, which he effected in a most signal manner, was rewarded with the constabulary of the castle of Inverness; and by the people of the country who spoke only Gaelic he was called 'Mac-in-tosh-ich,' that is to say 'Thane's Son,' or Chief, the first man in the country. He thus became the first of the name, and the progenitor of a long line of Chiefs, the present one being the 25th Chief of the McInroshes and the 21st of the clan Charran." The armorial bearings of this clan exhibit the cat as the crest with the motto: "Touch not the cat but with a glove." (Same reference as above.)

In 1904 Dove, Lockett & Stuart, lawyers of Edinburgh, wrote Charles Sumner McComber, lawyer, of Ida Grove, Iowa, pointing out the various forms of the name as known in Scotland, viz: McComber, McCumber, McCombie, McCombe, McOmish, etc., and after indicating the connection with the clan as above shown, adds this: "The clan of McInrosh was

one of the clans which took part in the memorable duel of the North Inch of Perth—see Scott's 'Fair Maid of Perth'—where they are designated the clan Charain. Scott's 'Waverley' makes a scion of the clan, Evan Dhu Maccombish, one of the leading personages." (See Sackpole's *MacComber genealogy* pp. 8 and 9.)

Sir Aeneas, in his MSS. history, makes mention of "John McIntosh of Forer, commonly called McCombie," as among "the oldest and wisest, not only of my own, but of all our neighbors' families."

The surname, "McIntosh," was used interchangeably with "McCombie" until after the settlement in Aberdeenshire, after the death of John McComie in 1676.

The family of McCombie took its rise as a separate and distinct branch of the clan McIntosh in the latter half of the 14th century.

In the Parliamentary Records of Scotland there is an original feu charter bearing date of September 7th, 1568, given at Abbotshall, by Thomas Scott de Pergons in favor of John McComy, Moir, (meaning great.) Janet Ratray, his wife, and their son and apparent heir, John McComy Moir, Jr. These McCombies are described as being "ab antiguo tenants and possessors of Finnagand in Glenshee."

Another instrument in the same Records, bearing date of September 30, 1751, says: "John Mackomie, younger of Finnagand, is in feu infefted and saised in all and hail the lands and shealing place in Glenbrig callit Cronahery," etc. Another of date November 11, 1577, called "Instrument of Tolérance," gives "tolérance, license and privilege to the said John McComas and his aires linnally to descend of his bodi to pasoure their guddis wyneforth of any part of the borch and leid array feu all of the saidis landis of Tarrydon underwyrtren, in the marches and meithis efter specefetit."

The McComies became connected with the family of Farquharsons by marriage, which family was descended from the ancient and powerful house of Cummings of Alyre, having branched from the parent stock about the year 1460.

The renowned Finla, Mor, the great hero of the Farquharsons, was born about 1487. In 1547 he was the Standard Bearer in the disastrous battle with the English, at Pinkie Cleugh, where he was slain. His second wife was Margary, daughter of Baron Reid of Kincardine, and their son, William Farquharson, married Beatrice Gordon, the daughter of Lord Sutherland.

John McComie, Mor, the younger, married Janet Farquharson, the daughter of William Farquharson and his wife, Beatrice Gordon.

Alexander McComie was their son; the name of his wife has not been found. But Alexander is twice mentioned as the father of John McIntosh, alias McComie, who sells and disposes of the lands of Finnagand and Cronahery, with the shealing of Garnell in 1652.

This contract of sale was entered "betwixt John Mackinrosche, alias McKomie of Farney and Elspet (Elizabeth) Campbell, his spouse," as principals of the first part. Elspet Campbell was the grand-daughter of

Donald Campbell of Denhead, and great-granddaughter of Archibald, Earl of Argyll. The historian remarks that "It was no doubt this connection with a scion of Argyll that induced John McComie to side with Parliament and Cromwell."

Sir Aeneas, whose MSS. history has been referred to, speaks of "John McIntosh, or McComie of Forer, of which Barony he had obtained a wader from Earl of Arllie in 1652." And the historians say that: "During the life of the McComie, Mor the family was at its highest point of influence and power in Perthshire and Forfarshire; and also sank to its lowest ebb, under powers and circumstances which the haughty chief was too proud to submit to, and, in his old age, unable successfully to resist. History and tradition alike bear testimony to the remarkable character of this Highland Chief. The sagacity and indomitable spirit that characterized his mental qualities were not less conspicuous among his contemporaries than his extraordinary bodily strength."

John McComie entered into possession of the Barony of Forer during the time of the Commonwealth. At such a time a man like McComie could not remain inactive. In the beginning, before the issues were fairly made, he sided with the King's party. In "The Montrose Papers" (James Graham, Marquis of Montrose)—we find, that John McCollmy was with Montrose at Appermuir, near Perth, in 1644, when McCollmy took prisoner Sir William Forbes of Craigvarra. It is evident that at this time McComie was on the side of the Royalists. But there is no doubt that he changed sides. His having married a Campbell would render it easy to turn his arms to help Argyll and the Covenanters. But the change, whatever led to it, was most disastrous to him and his family. In Chambers' History of the Rebellion in Scotland we find in the Appendix to Vol. II, under date Feb. 11, 1645, that John McComie was "foretauled for invasions of the North." And no sooner was the restoration accomplished than he began to harass him in person and property. In less than a year after the restoration of Charles II the Scottish Parliament passed "an act of discredit in favor of James Earl of Arllie against Johnne McIntosh, alias McComie of Forthar, at Edinburgh, May 3rd, 1661."

This was the year in which the Marquis of Argyll was executed. Notwithstanding all the ill which befell him at the Restoration, the long and eventful life of the McComie, Mor ended peacefully. He died at Crandart on the 12th of January, 1676, and was buried in Glenista churchyard beside two of his sons who were killed at Drumlogie. Through all Glenshee and Glenista his memory still lives.

The historian says: "Of the old Ha' of Crandart, Barony of Forfar or Forther, situated in the west of Forfarshire, in the Parish of Glenista, little remains;" but in the south end of the west wing of the present standing is a stone with an inscription. The stone seems to have been carried across the Bay of Isla, and doubtless once rested in the wall of the

old Hall. His descendants are glad to recognize the language of the inscription as the pious utterance of the redoubtable old Covenanter, McCornie, Mor, who once dwelt on this spot.

This is the inscription:

The Connection of Farquharsons and McCornie

In his "Rise of the Clans" Buchanan says: "The Farquharsons, a numerous clan on the banks of the Dee, trace their origin to the German Carri or Clan Chattan," the clan which includes the MacIntroshe, Shaws, McPhersons, etc. The same authority makes this statement: "MacDuff, Thane of Fife, Chief of the Farquharsons, had an ancestor named Sheagh or Shaw MacDuff, second son of Constantine, third Earl of Fife." How Shaw MacDuff acquired the name "MacIntroshe" has been already shown.

The great hero of the Farquharsons was Finla, Mor, who bore the Royal Standard in the battle of Pinkie, where he was slain in 1547.

We take up the line of descent with him, as sufficient for the present purpose.

Line of Descent of Elspet Campbell

The clan Campbell was perhaps the most powerful in Scotland, occupying almost the entire County of Argyll. According to the genealogist of the Argyll family their ancestors of the female side were possessors of Lochow, in Argyllshire, in the eleventh century. Galleopie (or Archibald) Campbell, a gentleman of Anglo-Norman lineage, acquired the lordship of Lochow by marriage with Eva, daughter of Paul O'Dwin, Lord of Lochow. They had a son, Archibald. Sir Colin Campbell, Mor, designated as dominus de Lochawe, (Lord of Lochawe), knighted by King Alexander III, in 1280, is spoken of by Douglas as "head of the family of Argyll; and all the Earls and Dukes of Argyll have retained the family name Campbell." James Robertson, in "Index of Missing Charters," says: "The first crown charter of the Argyll branch for lands in Argyllshire was one by King Robert Bruce to his nephew, Sir Colin, whose name is therein written 'Cambel'." It is for lands in Ardsonnahan and dared at Arbaroth 10th February, 1316. In "Scottish clans and their tartans," by W. and A. K. Johnston, we find it stated that "the first of the family to be ennobled was Sir Duncan, who assumed the designation Argyll, and was raised to the peerage in 1445 by James II, as Lord Campbell. His grandson, Colin, second Lord Campbell, was created Earl of Argyll in 1480."

Archibald, the second Earl, fell at Flodden, and Archibald, the fourth Earl, was the first Scottish nobleman to declare himself a Protestant.

From this family Elspet Campbell descended, who became the wife of John McCornie, of Forer. She was the grand-daughter of Donald Campbell, who was the grandson of Archibald Campbell, Earl of Argyll.

McComb in America

Of John McCornie, Mor, who died at Grandart, Parish of Glenisla, Forfarshire, Scotland, January 12, 1676, it has been written that: "In few districts in Scotland has the memory of a man, who died over two hundred years ago, been kept living so vividly by tradition as that of McCornie, Mor, in Glenishee and Glenisla."

After his death the family separated, the eldest son, Angus, resuming the old name, "McThomas," went South into Fifeshire, while the youngest son, Donald, retaining the name, McCornie, went North to Aberdeen-shire. Not long afterwards descendants of John McCornie were found in the great emigration of Scotchmen to the north of Ireland; thence the

representatives of the family, under the various forms of the name, found their way to America.

The family with which we are immediately concerned here, seems to have been settled in or near Ballymore, Parish of Ballymore, County Antrim, Ireland. Some of the immigrants still had property interests there as appears from such instruments as the Power of Attorney (see Appendix) signed by John McComb, and admitted to record at Trenton, N. J., November 24, 1746.

History confirms the family tradition of the coming to America of seven brothers McComb, at least, so far as four of these are concerned. In the first half of the 18th century James McComb and his brother, John, accompanied by their father, whose name is not given, were among the immigrants from the north of Ireland. These men were in this country prior to the year 1732. At the same time, or before, Robert McComb, another brother, arrived, while a fourth, William McComb, was settled on the west side of Derry, Pa., in 1752, according to Egles' "History of Harrisburg", how much earlier he may have arrived in the country does not appear. At later dates these men were followed by several cousins.

The first census of the U. S. in 1790 enumerated forty-four heads of families and nearly three hundred persons, sixteen years old and upward, bearing the name of McComb in one or other of its forms. Most of them were in what is now Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. Swope says, in "The History of Middle Spring Presbyterian Church," that "in 1738 the valley between Shippensburg and North Mountain, in the neighborhood of Orstown, was settled by Herrons, McCombs and Irwins." In the records of Franklin County, Pa., originally a part of Cumberland County, and in the lists of taxables the name often appears.

And Dr. Wing, in his history of the churches of Cumberland Valley, refers to the house of refuge near Dublin Gap, in North Mountain, known as "the McComb house." This substantial log building, with its upper story pierced with rifle ports, was standing up until twenty years ago or later. Known as McComb Fort.

There has been in existence in the family a persistent tradition that the name of the father of Robert McComb was Thomas, whose father was William, and his grandfather, Sir Thomas. This line I have not been able to verify at all, and note the tradition because it has been referred to by some of my correspondents and because it may stimulate further research.—P. H. K. McC.

William McComb, son of Robert McComb, (I), enlisted in the company of Captain James McConnell, Col. Warts and Morgan, July 20, 1776, from Cumberland County, Penna. At the fall of Fort Washington, on the Hudson, he was taken prisoner, Nov. 16, 1776. The following spring—in March—he was paroled. While a prisoner he was confined on board the prison ship "Jersey." The Records of Cumberland County, Penna, show that he enlisted a second time, in 1781, in Captain J. Miller's Company, Sixth Battalion, Cumberland County Militia, James Dunlap, Colonel. His application for a pension, in 1835, was allowed, as was also the application of his widow, Rebecca McComb, in 1839.

When Franklin County, Pa., was erected Mr. McComb found himself within its boundaries, where he resided on lands granted to him in fee, by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by Patent of date May 27, 1789. This tract lies in Lurgan Tp.

In the latter part of the year 1793, or the first of 1794, William McComb removed to Washington County, Penna, where his father and brothers, Robert and David, had already established themselves. Here he located within the bounds of Upper Buffalo Church, in Hopewell Tp., some eight or ten miles northwest of the town of Washington.

When this congregation was incorporated, in 1804, William McComb was elected a member of the first Board of Trustees. A colleague was Matthew Morrow. David McComb, probably William's brother, was ordained a Ruling Elder in Upper Buffalo Church in 1831.

The move to Washington County did not mitigate the "western fever," and in 1818 or 1819, William McComb set out for Ohio, with his family and those of his married sons and daughters. They floated down the Ohio from Wheeling to the mouth of the Scioto, in a keel boat. Pushing their craft up this stream as far as Chillicothe, where low water compelled them to abandon the boat, they made their way across the country to a place called Franklinton, on the Scioto, opposite Columbus.

Here they passed the winter. Eventually land was secured in Truro Tp., along Big Walnut Creek, eight or ten miles east of Columbus, where settlement was made and the opening of farms begun. William McComb bought land of William Thompson in 1820.

As soon as seed for a crop was in the ground, steps were taken to establish a church, and in 1820 Rev. James Hoge, D. D., of the First Presbyterian Church of Columbus, effected the organization of Truro Church, consisting chiefly of the McComb, Patterson, Taylor, Long and Chester families. William Patterson donated two acres of ground for a church and a burying ground; and his own wife, Jane McComb, was the first to be buried there. She died Nov. 9, 1821. The successive pastors of this church, which at one time ranked among the strong churches of the Presbytery, were Rev. Messrs. Matthew Taylor, Abner Leonard, Elias Vanderman, John M. Fulton, J. D. Smith, John Arthur, John Scott, Andrew Barr, W. Maynard.

In this Truro cemetery rest the mortal remains of William McComb and his wife, Rebecca Kearsley, and many of their descendants of several

generations. For two years before his death William McComb was totally blind, but continued to walk to church, led by his wife.

Robert Cooper McComb was named for Dr. Robert Cooper, many years pastor of Middle Spring Presbyterian Church, near Shippensburg, Cumberland Co., Pa.

Dr. Cooper's wife was Elizabeth Kearsley, the eldest sister of R. C. McComb's mother, Rebecca Kearsley.

R. C. McComb began his preparation for the ministry in Worthington Academy, near Columbus, Ohio. Later he entered Hanover College at Hanover, Ind. At that time the College was operated on the "manual labor plan," and he chose the trade of a cooper, at which he worked in the intervals of study. At least once he accepted a position to teach in Mississippi, in vacation; but the fact that he came from north of Mason and Dixon's line, caused him to be suspected as possibly an abolitionist. Finding that the attitude of "certain lewd fellows of the baser sort" had become threatening, his friends hurried him away, and, because he was

ill, they carried him several miles to the steamboat landing, in a hammock improvised from a blanket. In 1836 he taught in the Preparatory Department of Oakmont College, near Vicksburg.

Mr. McComb was one of the older students and along with one or two others, was dubbed "Father" by his fellows; it was "Father McComb," "Father Patterson," and "Father Skillingger"—with the boys, meaning what it might from that source.

Sabbath Schools were just coming into vogue and Mr. McComb was active in this work. His diary shows that progress was made in the face of much indifference, not to say positive opposition, on the part of too many in the church.

In connection with the College a Theological Seminary had been established at the head of which was Rev. John Matthews, D. D. This was the school which was afterwards removed, first to New Albany, Ind., and then to Chicago, Ill. Later it became known as "McCormick Seminary," in honor of its benefactor.

Having finished the college course to the end of the Junior year, Mr. McComb entered the seminary and graduated. In 1840 or 1841 he was ordained and installed Pastor of the Presbyterian Church in London, Madison Co., Ohio. The Parish of which this church was the center comprised the county, with numerous preaching stations, and its pastor rode a wide circuit, generally on horseback.

After resigning this charge he followed the large emigrations from these communities to the West; and in the Spring of 1875 he began to supply the church at Fort Madison, Ia., and also to serve as chaplain in the State Prison in the same place. The removal West was by boat from Cincinnati to Ft. Madison, Ia. The next Spring he accepted an invitation to the church at Crawfordsville, Ia., and took charge. But his health, which had been failing for some months, rapidly grew worse, and the urgent advice of physicians hastened his return to Ohio, where his family might be among kindred. And, at one o'clock in the morning of August 24, 1856, he quietly fell asleep, at the old homestead on "Cottage Farm," Walnut Hills; and his body was laid to rest in the churchyard at Pleasant Ridge, Hamilton County, Ohio, a few miles north of Cincinnati.

Ann Spencer Kemper, wife of R. C. McComb, died on the 5th of August, 1873, after eight or ten years of weary suffering, endured with a martyr's trusting patience; and her body was laid beside that of her husband, and that of her second son, Kearsley Grier, who had died at college at Hanover in 1862.
